FRENCH ONION SOUP

French onion soup is a type of soup based on meat stock and onions. It is often served with croutons or a slice of bread with cheese on the top.

Ingredients:

50g butter
1kg onions sliced
1.2 litres beef stock
Salt and pepper
6 slices of French bread toasted
125g Gruyere cheese

Method:

Melt butter in a pan. Add the onions and fry gently until golden. (30-40 minutes.) Add the stock and salt and pepper to taste. Bring to the boil, cover and cook for 20 minutes.

Heat the cheese on toast under the grill until golden brown.

Serve the soup in individual bowls with a slice of toast on top.

Did You Know? A Brief History of Brittany

Around 460 A.D., many Britons fled from the Anglo-Saxon invaders of these isles and crossed the Channel to France.

Where they settled became known as "La Petite Bretagne" (Little Britain) as opposed to "La Grande Bretagne" (Great Britain) In 825 it became a monarchy, proclaimed by the son of the Emperor Charlemagne, stretching through Rennes down to Nantes. However, it was continually attacked by the Normans and by 993 it became divided into two Dukedoms but managed to prosper and defy the rule of the King of France.

In 1491, Anne, Duchess of Brittany, married Charles VIII and became Queen of France. After his death in 1499, she married Louis XII in order to maintain the autonomy of her duchy.

Between 1491 and 1514 the imposing castle in Nantes was built as a fortress during the struggle for independence of the Duchy of Brittany.

During the 16th and 17th centuries, the castle became the Breton residence of the Kings of France. The dormer windows mark the union of Brittany and France – the porcupine of Louis XII faces the hare of Anne of Brittany.

In 1532, all Brittany became re-united with France by an Act of Union signed in Vannes. In 1561, Rennes became the seat of Parliament, to the detriment of Nantes.

In 1534, a Breton explorer named Jacques Cartier sailed up the St. Lawrence river and claimed Canada for France.

ACROSS THE CHANNEL AND OVER THE NET


